

My birds are enjoying their automatic waters. It's always fresh water and it's also nice for me

because I don't have to go out there and dump large containers of dirty water. That would cause a waste of water and time and ends up with mosquito larvae and such, in the dirty water.

As some of you may know, I am a still a full-time airline pilot, so I'm always looking for ways to make my emus a little more self-sufficient. I purchased a calf feeder, it's called a creeper, and it came with a three sided gate to keep mama cow from eating the calf's food. I didn't need that, so it's in my shed with a plywood top on it, so it's a nice big work table.

However I came home from my last trip to hear the news that my emus had dumped quite a lot of food on the ground underneath the feeder. What I came up with is that the feeder trough is very shallow and I'm sure those birds are just in there have a good old time picking through the food and throwing things around.

The feeder came with an adjustable gate to limit the amount of food that goes into the trough, however it still doesn't solve the problem of the trough being rather shallow and I was worried that not enough food would be dropping down in to the trough. So I took the gate instead and I bolted it onto the front effectively doubling the depth of the food trough and while there's still a little bit of food in the front of it but certainly not as much food as they were wasting before.

The feeder holds up to 600 lbs. of grain. Obviously not a good idea in this heat to have food in there for weeks, but I've been monitoring and calibrating.

QUESTIONS by Joylene Reavis Emu Feed

The topic of how important is a **balanced feed** for emus, came up recently. First off, I'd like to say that some dry dog foods will keep emus alive, but not much more.



We started out with a **well balanced feed supplied by the breeder**, where we purchased our first chicks. After 3 years he **quit delivering** feed and we had to look elsewhere. We obtained a feed formula from a large southern breeder and had it **custom ground at a local mill**. Our birds did fantastic on it. We had lots of chicks that dressed out with large amounts of meat and fat. After four years of feeding this feed we **started to have** trouble with chicks not being able to **break through the shell**, which seemed to be overly thick, plus, a lot of **mal-positioned** chicks that quickly ran out of air once they had internally pipped.

The following year we had a lot of **splayed legs** and the yearlings that were able to hatch started **feather picking**. They picked ALL the feathers off each other's backs. This is NOT good in January during a Wisconsin winter.

I talked to a Nutrena Feed representative who worked with poultry. He sad that feather picking is common in turkey when they are not receiving a balanced diet. He recommended that we **add whole** oats to the feed we had on hand. He said that besides the **nutritional value**, the texture of the whole oat kernel seemed to satisfy their urge to pick feathers and it did help. It was about this time that the **AEA Feed Formulator** was created. With some help we had a balanced formula created.

It took about 2 years of feeding this formula to get everything straightened around. It seems that the breeders can go quite a while on poor nutrition, if they were started out properly in their growing years. It is their **offspring that suffer most from a nutritional deficiency**.

I also found that **Wild Game Bird Feed** is really close to a balanced emu feed formula and can be used in a pinch. Besides being well balanced, it contains more of the **natural vitamins and colloidial minerals** rather than synthetic vitamins and crushed rocks that digest poorly.


